

# 100% Voting Congregation Tool Kit

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## Background

#### Who are we?

The Virginia Interfaith Center for Public Policy (VICPP) is a 501c3 nonprofit organization, and Virginia's oldest and largest faith-based advocacy group. VICPP has members, congregational partners, and chapters all over the state, and is committed to non-partisan voter education and mobilization, along with year-round civic engagement.

#### **VICPP's Mission**

To engage people of faith and goodwill to advocate for racial, social, and economic justice in Virginia's policies and practices through education, prayer, and action.

#### Why this year?

Presidential, Congressional, and local elections are always consequential. Presidents can affect social policy through the courts and legislation that can reshape the country. They can start wars or end them, embrace a role of leadership on the world stage – or retreat from it.

Domestically, American society is particularly volatile. The country is changing significantly, from economics and technology to culture and politics.

Undergirding this 2024 presidential and congressional election is a fight to own the outcome of the latest realignment in American politics. The country is sharply divided. America has always been split on who should lead it. A presidential candidate, for example, hasn't gotten more than 53% in an election since 1984. Just four times since the **popular vote** has been tracked, dating back to 1824, has a candidate gotten above 60%, it happened in 1972. From 1984 through 2016, the average **turnout** of registered voters is 53%. The 2020 election and one of our most controversial had 66% turnout.

Virginia will be voting for every single one of our congressional representatives and one of our national senators. In addition, 33 cities are electing City Council, 154 towns are electing Town Council, and several counties have other offices being elected.

This year's elections will be closer than ever, which means each vote will be magnified.

VICPP is working with faith communities to ensure that their members honor their sacred privilege of voting in a democracy. Congregations help by ensuring that people are registered, encouraging voting, and equipping people to advocate with candidates and elected leaders.

## 100 Percent Voting Commitment:

- Develop a plan to ensure that every eligible member is registered to vote, (either manually or electronically by working with VICPP).
  - More information on matching membership lists with the voter files on page 4. Other ways to make sure everyone is registered on pages 3 and 8.
- Distribute information about ways to vote through congregational sources (bulletins, newsletters, and social media posts).
  - Sample announcements on page 5, or on VICPP's social media.
- Promote the sacred privileges of voting (through sermons, prayers, litanies, and other appropriate opportunities).
  - Preaching support on page 7.
- Learn about candidates (by meeting them, asking questions, attending/ hosting candidate forums, and distributing information in candidate questionnaires).
- Participate in community-wide efforts to register people and to get them to the polls.
  - Resources to plan a "Souls to the Polls" event on page 6.
- Engage those who are not eligible to vote to participate in civic life and encourage others.

## **Registration and Voting Resources**

#### Virginia Department of Elections

(vote.elections.virginia.gov)

- Find your polling location.
- Confirm voter registration (or update with a new address).
- Register to vote.
- Request an absentee ballot.

## Virginia Public Access Project (vpap.org)

- Type in your address.
- Find information about your district.
- Find information about candidates

#### Setting up a voter registration table at your congregation

- Download registration forms from: <u>www.elections.virginia.gov</u>
- Schedule a time with your congregational leadership at the end of September or beginning of October.
- Set up a table in a communal space for weekend services.
  - If possible, bring a laptop so folks can register online.
  - Bring paper registration forms and pens.
  - Remind people of early voting (September 20 November 2), and that election day is November 5.
  - Encourage people to make a plan to vote!
  - Consider providing envelopes, stamps, return stickers, and address label stickers for mailing ("Virginia Department of Elections, 1100 Bank Street, Richmond, VA 23219").
- If someone misses the table at your congregation, share the news about same-day voter registration. They can register when they vote!

# Support checking voter registration

VICPP can help you identify who is registered and who is not within your congregation, as well as who might be registered but is an "infrequent voter" and might need encouragement. VICPP can match members with publicly available voter data through the Voter Activation Network, or VAN. A faith community exports its membership list in an Excel format and shares this spreadsheet with VICPP. This data remains private to your congregation. This gives data on who is registered to vote, how frequently members vote, and what legislative districts members reside in, which can help with advocacy.

## Souls to the Polls Event

The purpose of hosting a "souls to the polls" event is to get your congregation and the community excited about voting. By hosting a community event you can bless and celebrate participation in the 2024 election or encourage members to vote early. Additionally, the event is a call to justice, compassion, and civic engagement.

#### How to Host?

Consider hosting on **October 26** or **November 2**, when most localities offer weekend early voting. Otherwise, pick a date during the early voting period (between September 20 and November 2).

#### • Option 1: Caravan to the polls

- Meet at your congregation in the morning, and plan for your clergy person to offer a blessing of the vote.
- Offer carpools to members to registrar locations (independent cities and counties will have separate registrars).
- Reconvene at the congregation after voting for lunch (or donuts)
- Consider canvassing your neighborhood to turn out additional voters for election day.

#### • Option 2: Souls to the poll's festival

- Find an area on your congregation's property where you can safely host a large gathering.
- Allow the event to be open to all, as this can also be a way to engage more with the community.
- Provide music, food, and games.
- Offer an award system for those who show up to the event wearing an "I Voted" sticker.
- Have a table on voter registration, how to vote, and how to find out about candidates.

# Same day voter registration

In 2022, a new law went into effect in Virginia that allows people to register as a voter all the way up to election day. This allows Virginians to cast a provisional ballot, even if they hadn't previously registered, and will keep them on the voter rolls for all upcoming elections. People can utilize same-day registration for both early voting and on election day. This flyer is available on VICPP's website, and you can publicize it in your faith community.
